All that there truly can be are the ideals and our efforts to relate to them with all of our being. The practice is Awakening.

Deshi: What of motivation? Should not something motivate us - something pulling us forward?

Sensei: We cannot be pulled into the spiritual world. We can only be repulsed from the material world. So rather than seeking a pulling energy, we must find this pushing energy.

Deshi: What is the engine of such energy?

Sensei: It is our will alone.
